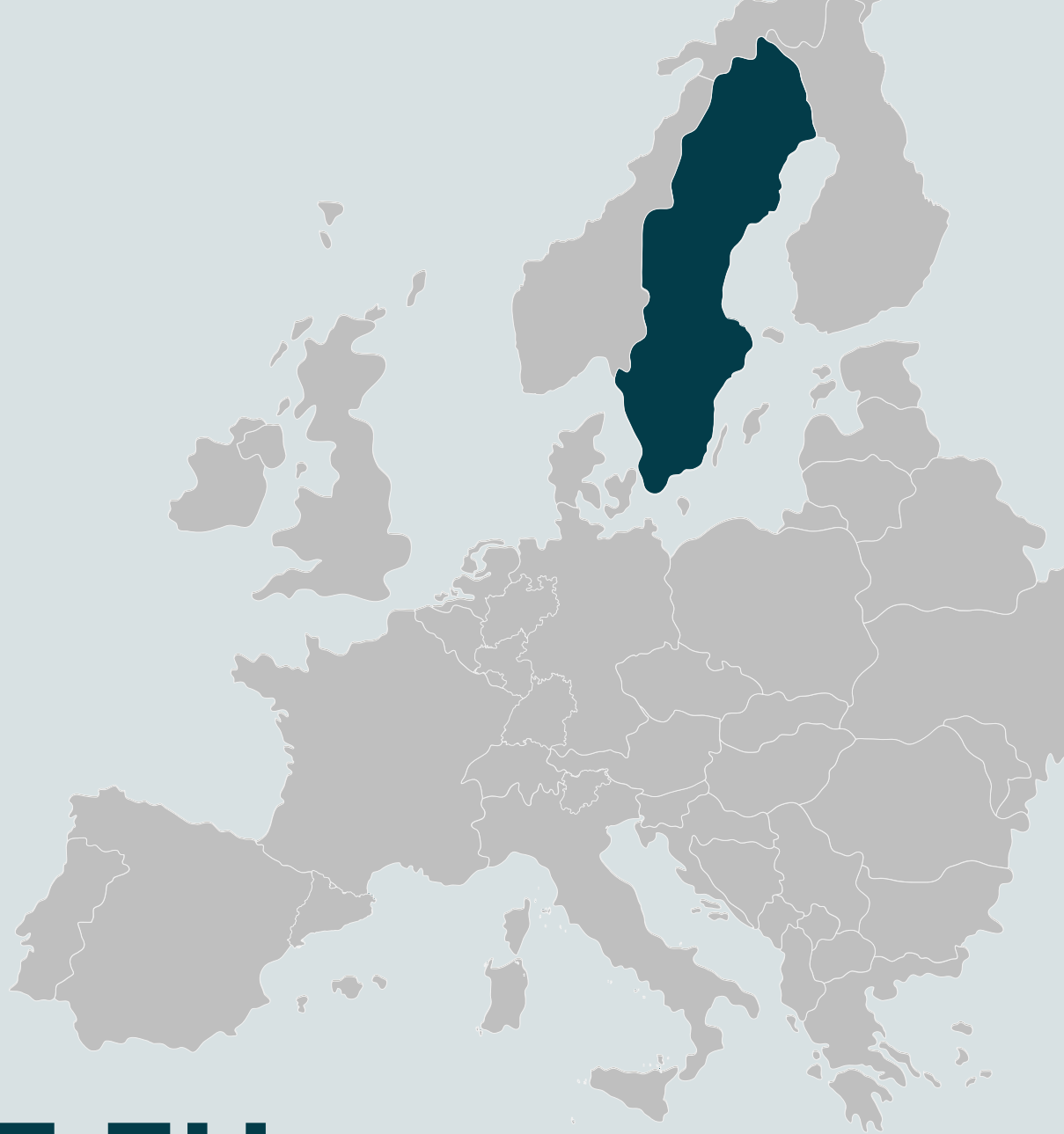

Waste collection organisation in Sweden

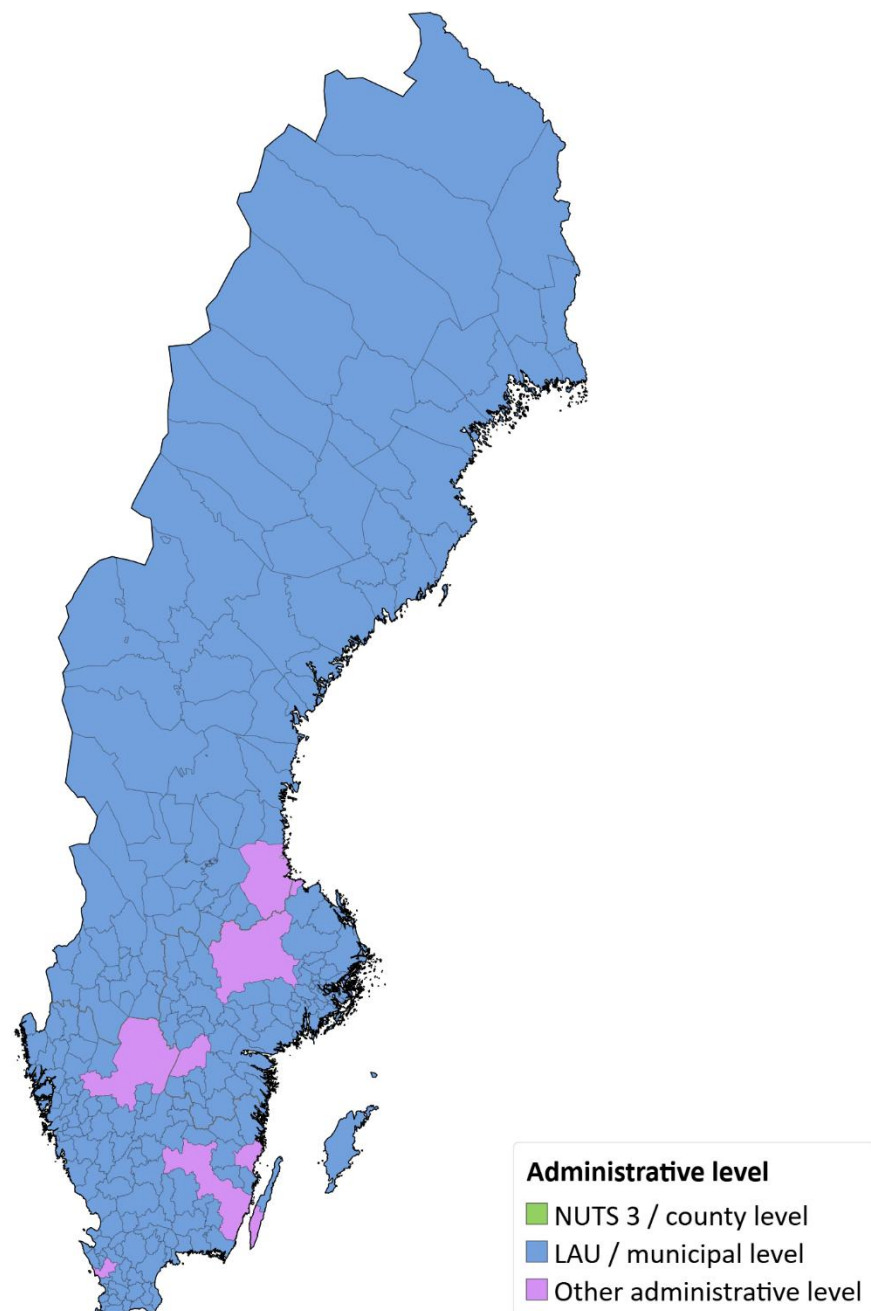
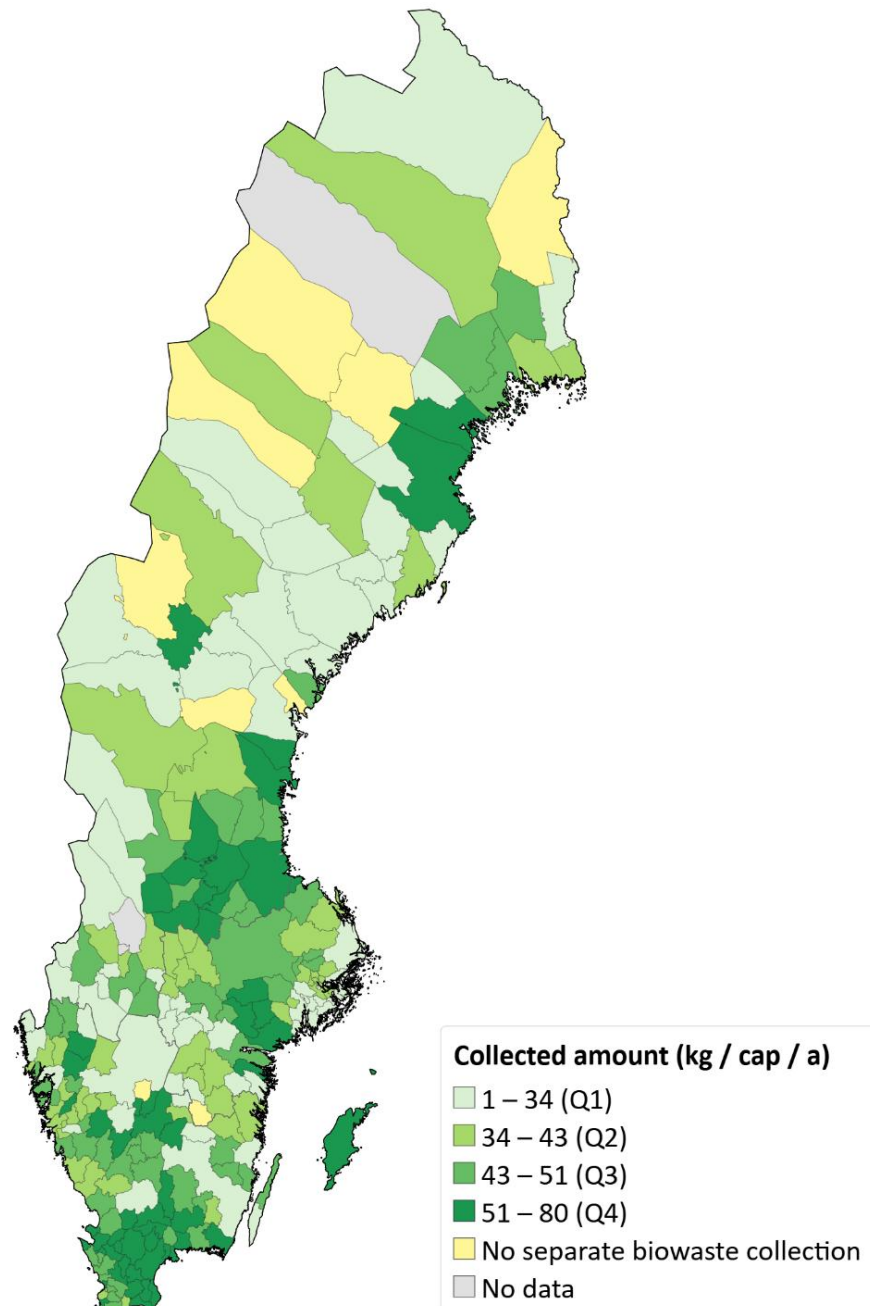


Figure 1: Administrative level of waste collection in Sweden (2024)

As shown in Figure 1, Sweden primarily organises waste collection at a municipal level. In southern Sweden, however, some municipalities have formed a consortium to manage waste jointly. In total, there are 254 distinct waste collection areas.

The mean quantity of separately collected biowaste was 42 ± 13 kg per inhabitant and year (median = 43), with a minimum of 1, and a maximum of 80 (Figure 2).

Infobox: Separate collection of biowaste in Sweden

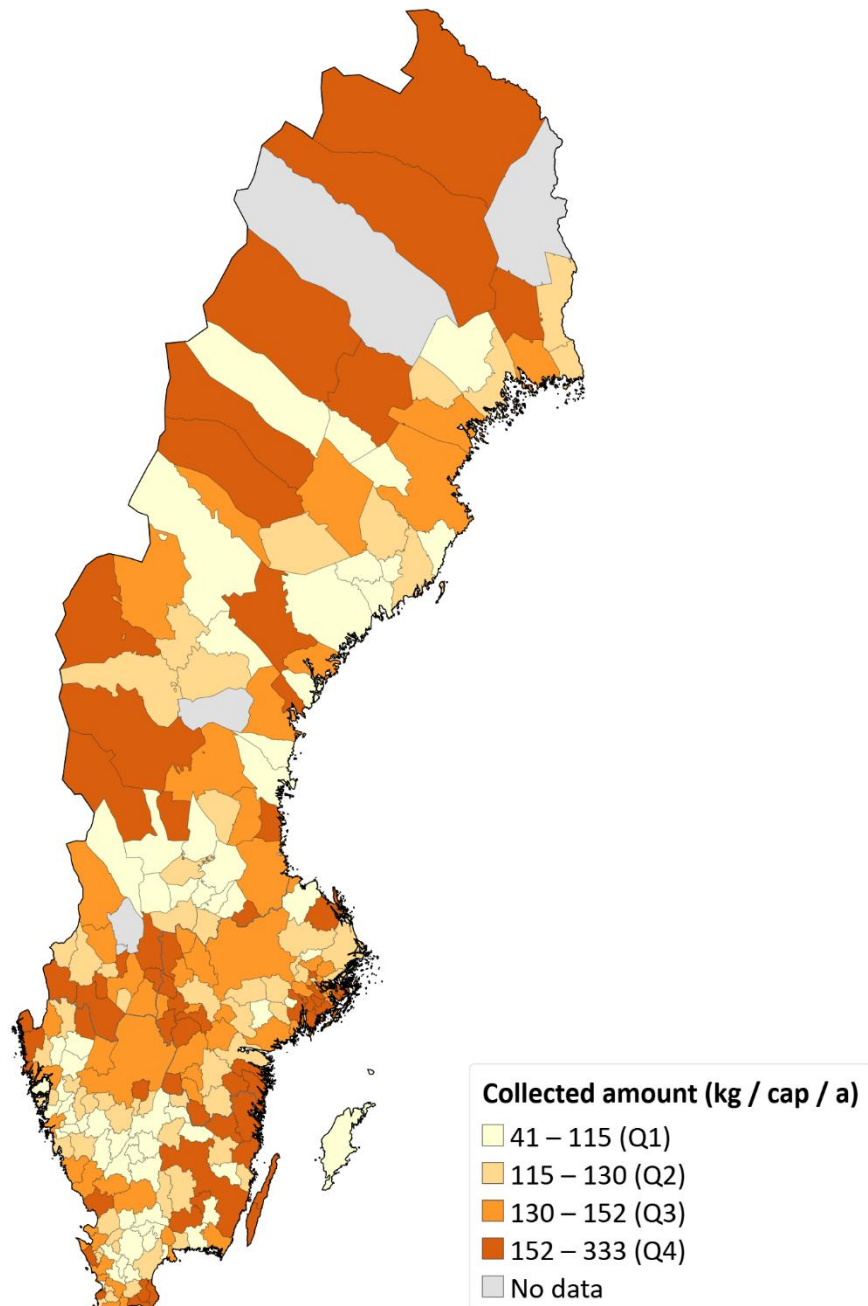
Separate collection from households and businesses is mandatory since the beginning of 2024. Not only that, the mandate also requires property-close collection, i.e. door-to-door collection (“fastighetsnära”)⁴. Municipalities can only postpone implementation if Naturvårdsverket grants a time-limited dispensation based on specific legal grounds such as technical infeasibility, unreasonable cost, or better overall environmental performance of another solution.

Biowaste collection in Sweden is focussed on single-stream food waste (*Matavfall*). Additional collection for green waste exists. Door-to-door separate collection of food waste is offered to 99.3% of the population (245 collection areas), and 0.7% are not offered any option for separate collection for it.

Residual waste is collected door-to-door from all households in Sweden.

Residual waste stream quantities

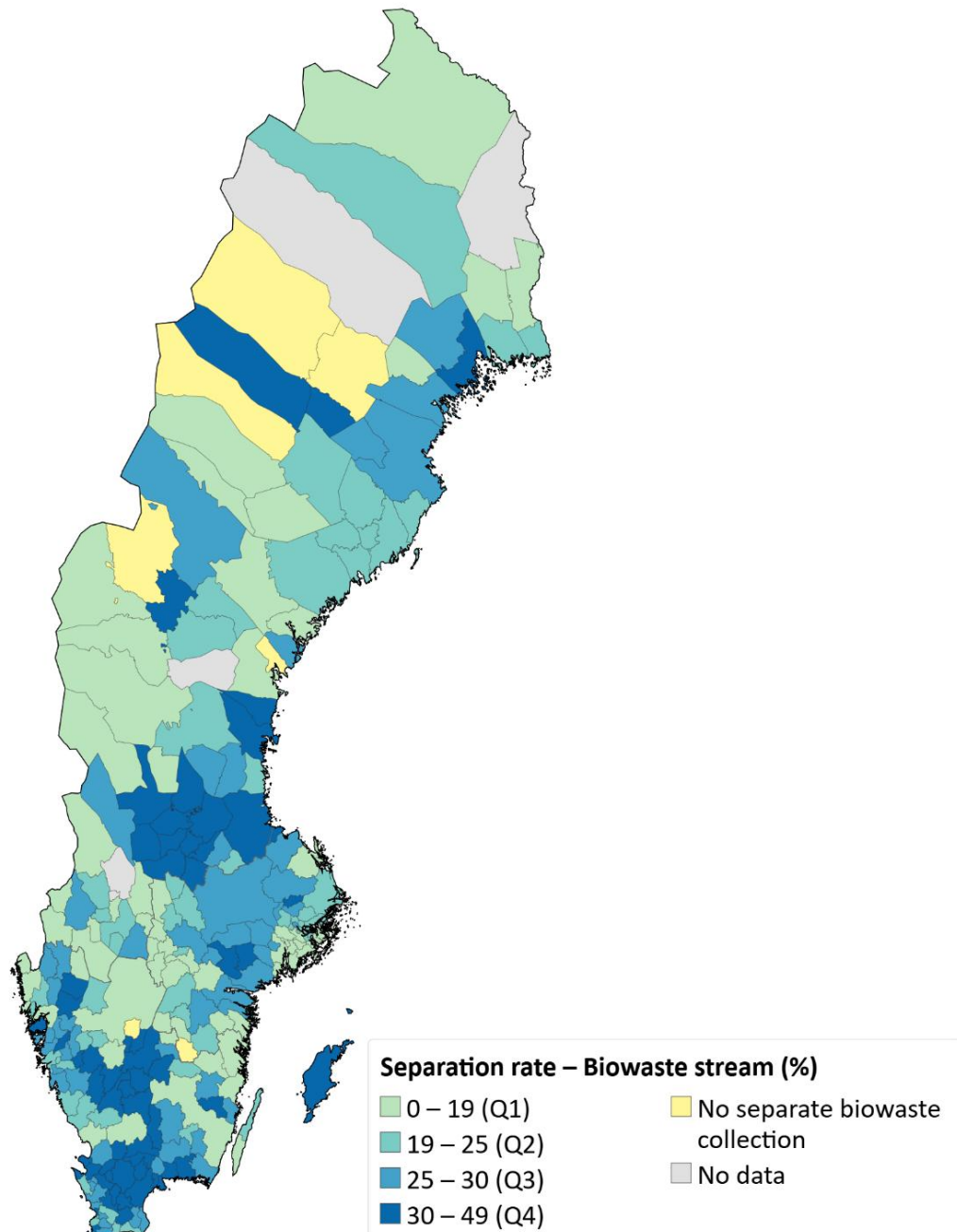

The mean quantity of collected residual waste was 136 ± 34 kg per inhabitant and year (median = 131), with a minimum of 41, and a maximum of 333 (Figure 3).

The biowaste stream separation rate ($SR_{BW, gross}$) indicates for all collection areas a residual-waste-dominant collection (Figure 4). The mean $SR_{BW, gross}$ was 24 ± 8 % (median = 24), with a minimum of 1, and a maximum of 49.
